#### **FOREWORD**

The information contained in this volume has been gathered from many and varied sources. More than fifteen thousand vital record entries in the six New England states have been collected and compiled. Abstracts of hundreds of probate records and registries of deeds in eighteen counties have been prepared. Inscriptions in scores of cemeteries have provided many additional facts. An extensive correspondence with hundreds of descendants in every part of the country has enabled the compiler to tie into the family many migratory branches which otherwise would never have been located. Use has been made of the records available at the Federal Census Bureau and the Congressional Library at Washington. Thousands of family genealogies, town histories, and general reference volumes in libraries throughout the entire East have been consulted. Some have supplied a single item; others, several paragraphs of information.

Although every precaution has been taken to assure a maximum of accuracy and every effort has been made to complete all McIntire lines of descent, the author does not in any wise infer that this volume is infallible and much less that it is complete. He trusts that any errors that may have crept in will be judged as leniently as may be. In passing, it may be said that he has endeavored to complete the records of McIntire daughters only in the first generation, since obviously a more complete history of their descendants properly belongs in genealogies of their

respective family names.

Since it is his intention to continue his researches in order to obtain a more nearly complete record of the family and in time to print an appendix containing such additions, the compiler is anxious to enlist the cooperation of all descendants, especially of

those whose family records are now incomplete.

While every effort has been made to simplify the arrangement of the genealogical facts which are presented in this volume, a word of explanation may be helpful. The marginal numbers which precede the names of some of the children indicate that more extended accounts of these descendants appear later in the records. The small exponents are generation numbers. The abbreviations which are used in this volume are generally employed by most genealogists and include: abt.—about; d. s.p.—died without issue; int.—intention of marriage; q.v.—which see; res.—resided; and s.b.—stillborn.

The author makes no claim that the McIntires are a superior family. They do, however, represent a cross section of American life from the middle of the seventeenth century to the present day.

Among them may be found farmers and mariners, tallow chandlers and woodcarvers, physicians and clergymen—in fact, all of the vocations and professions are represented. Many of them became leaders among their fellow men; a few were prominent in the affairs of state and achieved renown.

It has always been the author's belief that a volume, however accurate and complete its birth, marriage, and death dates, cannot escape from being monotonous without the addition of supplementary historical, biographical, and anecdotal material. While he has refrained from using undesirable eulogistic sketches, he has included biographical material which has been imper-

sonally gathered and objectively presented.

The author is indebted to a countless number of descendants who have furnished a wealth of material about their respective family units. It would be impossible to name them all. He wishes, however, to acknowledge his indebtedness to Mr. Frederic M. McIntire, Miss Blanche E. McIntire, and the late Miss Henrietta E. McIntire who generously permitted him to use the records which had been compiled by their late father, Hon. Charles J. McIntire of Cambridge, Mass. He takes pleasure in acknowledging the aid of Miss Esther H. Bacon of Boulder, Colo., Mr. Fred E. McIntire of Concord, N. H., Mr. Burt B. Farnsworth of Springfield, Mass., and Mr. Donald C. McIntire of Glen Ellyn, Ill., in supplying much valuable information. To the late Mrs. Samuel R. Putnam and to her daughter, Miss Lillian M. Putnam of Claremont, N. H., he is greatly indebted for the map of Scotland and for the family coat of arms, which is reproduced as the frontispiece. And, especially, he wishes to thank his father, Mr. Harry J. McIntire, without whose indefatigable interest and invaluable assistance it would have been impossible to complete this volume for many years. To them and to all others who, in whatever degree, have aided and encouraged this undertaking, he expresses his deepest gratitude.


The MacIntyre arms are quartered. The original family arms, which appear in the upper left and are repeated in the lower right, consist of a red spread eagle on a gold background and indicate service in the foreign wars. The designs in the upper right and lower left are arms of the MacDonalds and the Campbells and were acquired through marriages of MacIntyre chiefs to heiresses of these families. Their background throughout is The galley, black with red flags, indicates service in Spanish Armada campaigns. The design in the lower left and the cross-crosslet fitchée are sable and, consequently, indicative The esquire's helmet above the escutcheon indiof a crusader. cates the rank of the owner. It is surrounded by a mantelet or lambrequin in the original metal and color of the MacIntyre, red and gold. The wreath of entwined ribbon which surmounts the helmet is a relic of the tournaments of the fourteenth century. The crest, a "dexter [right] hand holding a dagger in pale [perpendicularly] proper [in natural colors], pays tribute to the early ancestor who severed with a dirk the thumb on his left hand to fill a hole in the side of his vessel.

The traditional history of the MacIntyre Clan indicates that they are probably a sept of the MacDonalds of Sleat, Skye. This theory gains support by the fact that the MacIntyres have

always made use of the MacDonald badge, the heather.

A romantic legend suggests that on one occasion the Mac-Donald chief's galley sprang a dangerous leak. Without other means to stop it, a clansman forced his thumb into the hole and cut it off with his dirk so that he might be at liberty to assist in the work of sailing the vessel. By this drastic expedient he saved the crew from drowning and was henceforth called Saor na h-ordaig, the Thumb Carpenter.

Another explanation, which is equally fantastic if not quite so heroic, suggests that two brothers of the MacDonald Clan quarreled over the ownership of an island. It was agreed that each row out to the island and that the first to *touch* it should become its owner. One brother realizing that he was losing the race drew his knife, cut off a left finger, and tossed it upon the

shore whereupon his brother "cursed him long and loud and

deep."

The tradition adds that a son of the original thumbwright became known as Mac-an-t-saoir, the Carpenter's Son. Resolving to seek his fortune elsewhere, he departed from Sleat in his galley taking with him his revered white cow and vowing that he would settle wherever she would first lie down to rest after landing. This she did at Glenoe near Bunawe in the district of Lorne, a place still known as Larach na Ba Baine, the Site of the White Cow.

A legend which has survived for generations suggests that during Montrose's invasion of Argyll in 1644, Alaster MacColkeitach with his brigade marched through Glenoe. In the belief that he was still among his traditional enemies, the Campbells, he ordered that all the houses be destroyed. The absent chief's dwelling which was roofed with heather was the first to be consigned to the flames. A burning coal was brought from the hearth and thrust deep into the thatch, but before the fire had made progress Alaster was informed that it was the home of the chief of the MacIntyres. "Then forbear," he exclaimed, "and extinguish the flames, for it is the house of our blood." The coal, it might be added, was extracted from the roof and, as a relic to prove the respect paid by a Scotsman to the traditionary ties of kindred, was carefully preserved by the MacIntyres for many

generations.

From this point the history of the Clan is well documented. It is a certainty that the MacIntyres of Glenoe occupied these lands from 1300 until 1806 and served as Hereditary Foresters of the Stewarts and Campbells, Lords of Lorne. The tenure by which they held Glenoe from the Campbells of Glenorchy was a payment annually in summer of a snowball and a white fatted The snowball was easily obtained at Cruachan.\* As they always kept several white cows, a white fatted calf was readily procurable. Each year it was delivered at a stone called *Clach* an Laoigh Bhiadhta, the Stone of the Fatted Calf. This arrangement continued until the beginning of the eighteenth century when the tenant of Glenoe unfortunately agreed to the payment being commuted into money. In time this rent was increased to such a large sum that the MacIntyres were unable to meet their payments and in 1806 were obliged to leave their hereditary home.

There was a large colony of MacIntyres resident for many generations at the village of Cladish, Loch Awe, where they carried on an extensive weaving industry. A specialty with them was the production of very finely woven hose and garters which were made in the various clan tartans. No Highland

costume, however expensive, was complete at that period without a pair of Cladish garters. There were MacIntyres in Badenoch who were attached to the Clan Chattan, while others of the clan, in the district of Rannoch in Perthshire, were famous for centuries as musicians and from 1680 were the hereditary pipers to chiefs of the Clan Menzies.

The MacIntyres of Glenoe have, however, been the clan's chiefs. After Donald, a doctor, succeeded to the chieftainship of the clan, he went in 1783 to New York. His oldest son, James, who was born two years later at Newburgh, sailed to Scotland in 1806; married Ann Campbell of Corries, Glenorchy, in 1817; returned to the United States in 1822; and settled on a farm in Fulton County, N. Y. His grandson, James, born at Fonda, N. Y., January, 1864, is the last known chieftain of the clan.

Most celebrated of all of the clansmen was Duncan Ban MacIntyre, the Gaelic poet of the eighteenth century who ranks next to Ossian as the bard of the Gaelic race. He was born of poor parents at Druimliaghart in Glenorchy in 1724, fought as a Hanoverian at Falkirk in 1746, and served as a private in a Highland fencible regiment until it was disbanded in 1799. He was imprisoned when he "gave voice to a strenuous indignation" to an act which forbade use of the traditional Highland garb. Thirty-five years later, when the act was repealed, he "burst forth in joyous strain" with his Song of the Breeches. "No longer are Scotsmen obliged to blush when in the presence of the fair," he exclaimed, "and now the men of the hills appear again in their loved tartans, the coat with the strife of colors; gracefully stream our belted plaids, our hose reach not the knee, nor hinder the step." Although he was unable to write or to speak English and received no formal education, he excelled in every kind of It has been said that he could repeat in Gaelic all of his poems, some seven thousand verses. A tenth edition of his works was published in Edinburgh in 1887, seventy-five years after his death.

Most of the MacIntyres migrated to America during the great Scottish migrations of the eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries and settled along the entire Atlantic seaboard from Nova Scotia to Georgia. There is still, however, a Clan MacIntyre Society in Scotland with headquarters at Glasgow.

# DESCENDANTS OF PHILIP McINTIRE OF READING, MASSACHUSETTS

After he had defeated the English Royalists, beheaded King Charles, and turned a rebellious Ireland "into a bloody shambles," Oliver Cromwell with an army of fifteen thousand men proceeded to the conquest of Scotland, the last kingdom remaining loyal to the Stuarts. Many of his men were seasoned veterans of the Irish campaign; a third were mounted troops. Leading his "fanatical Croppies," he reached Edinburgh after several minor skirmishes and marched on to Dunbar, a town on the east coast of Scotland at the mouth of the Firth of Forth. General David Leslie, in command of the Scottish troops, by encamping upon the heights of Lammermoor above the town and seizing Cockburnspath, cut off any possible English land retreat to Durham and Berwick-on-Tweed. Leslie was aware that while his troops outnumbered Cromwell's forces, they were untrained clansmen and had little hope of winning any major encounter with their trained opponents. He cautiously proposed to retain his own unassailable position and to starve out the trapped English. When he was informed by the zealous Presbyterian preachers who had "wrestled with the Lord in prayer night and day and finally had assurance in a 'revelation' that the Lord of Hosts would deliver Agag [Cromwell] into their hands," Leslie abandoned his caution and on Sept. 3, 1650, marched his army down the hillside. Within an hour, the English had slain three thousand Scots and had taken ten thousand prisoners. About half of the prisoners were so exhausted by their flight and disabled by their wounds that they were released.

At least three of the MacIntyre Clan,\* Philip, Micum, and Robert, were among the captives taken by the redoubtable Cromwell and at his command deported to America. A number of authorities have contended that they were of the same family, possibly brothers.† While there is no documentary proof to support such a belief, neither is there any to refute it.

<sup>\*</sup> Although the members of the Clan in Scotland still retain the original MacIntyre spelling of the surname, recent descendants of Philip have almost invariably used the Americanized McIntire. To avoid confusion, the author has somewhat arbitrarily used this spelling for all of Philip's descendants. The reader will appreciate the necessity of this decision when he realizes that in the town records of Reading and Salem, Mass., alone, twenty-four different spellings of the surname appeared before 1850. These variations include: Maccantire, Macentier, Macentire, MacIntire, MacIntyre, Mackantire, Mackentier, Mackentire, Mackentire, Mackentire, Mackentire, Mackentire, Mackentire, Mackentire, Mackentire, Mackentire, Mackintire, McIntyre, McIntyre, and McKentire.

<sup>†</sup> Eaton in his Annals of Warren, Me., stated that there were seven brothers transported to different parts of America by order of Cromwell. This suggestion was also made by Josiah Stover McIntire, a descendant of Micum, in an article which appeared in the Biddeford (Me.) Journal of Jan. 12, 1892. This allusion to the mystical seven is probably unfounded.

Romantic legends which have survived the centuries recall Micum's\* heroic escape from impending execution at the Cathedral of Durham, his marriage to the young McEneer widow whom he had "inherited from a neighboring cousin," and his subsequent display of pugnacity when "with his great foot and hand he kicked and cuffed Sam Treathy so he could neither go or stand." After serving seven years as an indentured servant at Dover, N. H., he settled at Salmon Falls, N. H., but before 1670 removed to York, Me., and engaged in fishing and farming until his death.

Robert, as a witness in a trial in the Essex (Mass.) Court, Nov. 24, 1653, stated that he was twenty-four years of age and was employed to "cart coals" at the Lynn Iron Works. It seems probable that he went with his employers to Rhode Island

where the foundry was removed a few years later.†

Philip, a youth in his early twenties, was placed aboard the good ship *Unity*, which on Nov. 11, 1650, set sail for the colonies.‡ After serving his seven years' compulsory service to "work out the expense of his passage and sustenance," he settled in the northeastern part of Reading, Mass., within a few miles of the Salem line.§ His name first appears in the town records in 1665, when he paid a ministerial tax of ten pence. The following year, he drew land in the "Division of the Great Swamp" when the town of Reading ordered that "the Great Swamp and all other Swamps that are wett and fitt to make meadow shall all be [divided] quantity and quality considered to every man according to each man's proportion." He was married at Reading, Sept. 6, 1666, to Mary———, surname unknown.

It appears that the town fathers had purchased the site of Reading from the Indians, but had neglected to pay the ten pounds which had been promised to them. In 1686 an assessment was laid to raise the money, and Philip was, accordingly, taxed

one shilling and four pence.

<sup>\*</sup> Descendants of Micum McIntire, a genealogy comprising over nineteen hundred descendants of Micum, was compiled and published by the author of this volume in June, 1940.

<sup>†</sup> Early in the eighteenth century there were McIntire families in Smithfield, Gloucester, Cumberland, and Pawtucket, R. I. It appears probable that they may have been descendants of the aforementioned Robert.

In all, one hundred fifty Scottish prisoners were taken in the *Unity* to New England. John Becx of London, who was interested primarily in the Saugus iron mines, had financed their transportation. Col. Charles E. Banks has written: "The *Unity* buffeted the tempestuous, wintery seas of the Atlantic, and as it usually took six weeks to cross in favorable seasons, she could not have made Boston harbor before the end of December. They suffered from scurvy on the voyage, but how many died is not known. The prisoners remaining, after sixty were sent to Lynn, were sold to purchasers willing to pay the price and were distributed to numerous towns in Massachusetts, New Hampshire, and Maine. The prevailing quotation was between twenty and thirty pounds for each man, which was received for their transportation." A year later, the Scots under the youthful Charles II, whom they had proclaimed as their king, resolved to invade England. Cromwell, learning of the Scots' advance, proceeded to Worcester where the Covenanters had encamped. On Sept. 3, 1651, a year to the day after the "Race of Dunbar," he surrounded the town and after a fierce five-hour engagement virtually annihilated the Scots. Thousands of Highlanders fell in battle. Subsequently, 272 of the prisoners were shipped to Boston in the *John and Sarah*. Like those taken at Dunbar they were distributed throughout the colonies and sold into slavery.

The ancient seat of the family is said to be "in the Thomas Rayner field, northeast of his residence where there is, or recently was, an old cellar hole."

In 1685 the town decided "that all those persons that inhabit on the north side of Ipswich River in our town bounds shall have those two pieces of land namely: the towne's lands in Sadler's Neck, so called, and that piece of common land that lyeth at the upper end of Mr. Bellingham's farme and belongs to the towne." Philip, one of the eight inhabitants of this precinct, received one of the grants. Three years later, he contributed three pounds toward the erection of a new meetinghouse.

On Apr. 14, 1719, several months before his death, he conveyed

his homestead at Reading to his son David.

Daniel McIntire, a farmer, moved from Reading to nearby Salem in 1696, and resided in that section which has since been set aside as Peabody. The Salem Commoners Records from 1713 to 1739 contain a list of the "names of the proprietors of the common lands in Salem living in the middle precinct."

Daniel McIntire was assigned one right.

The inventory which was prepared in 1730 by the appraisers in the settlement of his estate listed the following articles: wearing apparel, a cane, two hats, cart and wheels, house tackling, pair of handirons, frying pan, thongs and shovel, two wheels, cart rope and lamp, beetle rings and wedges, three pitchforks, thirty pounds of tobacco, hamper, small quantity of flax in the bundle, bed and bedding, pewter, two tables and a chest, twelve bushels of Indian corn, bushel and half of beans, iron crowbar, twelve sheep, three cows, two year-old heifers, mare and calf, and three swine.

Thomas McIntire, a carpenter and housewright, located at Salem in 1701. On Feb. 5, 1730, his wife complained to the court "against her brother Ebenezer Moulton for his concealing and withholding the last will and testament of their father, Robert Moulton, deceased."

He removed to the Charlton district of Oxford, Mass., before 1746 and signed the petition of Mar. 27, 1754, which requested a separation from Oxford and the incorporation of the town of Charlton.

Because his eighty-four year old widow, who was "incapable of taking care of herself," resided with her son Thomas "where she is not nor can't be guarded for in any tolerable degree," the town selectmen on July 13, 1757, "fully discoursed with her four sons living in Charlton and found that her son Lt. Obadiah McIntire is very willing and disposing to take good care of her if she will tarry with him."

In making his defense, he pleaded that he lived at the westerly end of the town, a very great distance from the meetinghouse, and that the roads were in such bad condition that it was almost impossible for him to get to the place of worship from his home. He was ordered to pay the costs of prosecution amounting to three pounds and sixteen shillings, but feeling a sense of injury over the imposition of costs, he refused to pay them and suffered himself to be committed to jail rather than to do so. It has been said that his neighbors, whose cause he was representing, paid the costs to release him and that he was soon discharged from custody. In 1757 he marched with Capt. Richard Dresser's Co. to Sheffield on the alarm for the relief of Fort William Henry.

Martha. In the August term of court, 1736, the selectmen of Dudley, Mass., directed their constable to warn "Martha McIntire, a single woman, to depart this town." She was obliged "to answer for the crime of fornication, appeared in court, confess'd ye crime, and was fined to the king thirty shillings and costs, which she paid," whereupon she lodged a complaint against Nathan Dennis‡ "for his being the father of a bastard child begotten of her body." He appeared in court, but offered no defense, and was forced to sign a two hundred pound bond that he would "save and indemnify said town of Dudley from any charge legally laid upon them on account of said bastard child." It appears that she then returned to Reading, for on Mar. 24, 1737, "Martha McIntire and her two children, who came from Oxford or Dudley in Feb. 1737," were warned to depart from Reading. Only known child (McIntire)4: Edward, b. Dudley, May 26, 1733; res. Oxford in 1754, when he signed the petition to the General Court requesting the partition of the Charlton settlement as a distinct district.

Ebenezer McIntire moved from Salem to Oxford, Mass., in the autumn of 1733, secured one of the best farms in town, and built a large and substantial dwelling which he maintained as the village tavern and "place of entertainment for strangers and travelers." He has been referred to as "public spirited, liberal,

and patriotic, a natural leader of men."

Because they were "more than ten miles from the meeting-house, yet always taxed to all the charges of the town," many of the townspeople grew dissatisfied and in 1754 petitioned the General Court to set off their settlement as a distinct district. Ebenezer McIntire, one of the petitioners, was among the foremost who urged for separate government. The petition was granted, and the first town meeting of Charlton, "to elect such town officers as the law requires and to see whether the district will let their swine run at large the year ensuing," was held at his

tavern, Mar. 12, 1755. All of the subsequent meetings, both civil and religious, were held there until 1761.

During the French and Indian War, Aug. 1757, he served in Capt. Richard Dresser's Co. and marched ninety-eight miles to

Sheffield on the relief of Fort William Henry.

On Jan. 16, 1758, the townspeople decided that the meeting-house "should be located at the place of a stake a little north of Ebenezer McIntire's house." In Feb. 1759, "in consideration of the love and good will I do bear to the district of Charlton and to the inhabitants thereof," he donated the land for the meeting-house, common, and training field. Five years later, he pre-

sented to the town an acre of land for a "burying yard."

Ebenezer McIntire died intestate. In an agreement made by his heirs, Mar. 29, 1776, it was decided that his widow, "for the maintenance of herself and Daniel McIntire, an heir incapable of taking care of himself," should receive two hundred dollars, use of the pasture, the indoor movables, two cows, the privilege of keeping five sheep annually, the use of the house cellar and chamber, firewood "to be found by Ebenezer," and the "privilege of every ninth barrel of cyder yearly out of Nathaniel's part, she making the same, and what apples she is a mind to use."

In Aug. 1757, during the French and Indian War, he marched ninety-eight miles to Sheffield on the alarm for the relief of Fort William Henry. From 1765 to 1773, he owned the old Campbell Tavern.

Samuel, John, and Joseph." In the event that she married again, "her right to the yearly payment of the grain, malt, meat, sauce, apples, cider, wood, the improvment of the cows and horse, house, garden, and other privileges shall cease and instead thereof my said three sons shall pay her a dower of two pounds, thirteen shillings, and four pence lawful money yearly during her natural life." To his sons were given apparel, live stock, husbandry tools, cider casks, two cedar meat tubs, an oak tub, and "six chairs that came by my first wife."

On Jan. 9, 1775, Ezra McIntire was selected "to see that the directions of the Continental and Provincial Congresses are strictly adhered to in Charlton." With the outbreak of hostilities, he enlisted in Capt. Jacob Davis' Co. and marched to Roxbury on the Lexington alarm of Apr. 19, 1775. When on June 17, 1776, the town voted "to support the Continental Congress in declaring independence of Great Briton with our lives and fortunes if they shall think it expedient for our safety," Ezra McIntire was appointed to the Committee of Correspondence, Inspection, and Safety. His appointment was reaffirmed in 1777, and again in 1778.

For many years he owned the old Black Horse Tavern, the grounds of which he beautified with gardens and hedges at considerable expense. In 1852 he founded the Winchester Gas Company, which "made some experiments in the manufacture of gas, but was never able to raise the capital for commercial success and disappeared leaving behind it no ripple pronounced enough to stir men's memories." Authorities have agreed that Samuel McIntire was probably the most highly skilled American woodcarver, designer, and architect of his time. Unfortunately, despite the fact that two books have been written about his work, few of the details of his

life have been preserved.

Possibly the best sketch of him, and this is exasperatingly brief, is to be found in the diary of the Rev. William Bentley, pastor of the East Church, Salem. On Feb. 7, 1811, he wrote as follows:

"This day Salem was deprived of one of the most ingenious men it had in it: Samuel McIntire, aet. 54, of Summer Street. He was descended of a family of carpenters who had no claims on public favor and was educated at a branch of that business. By attention he soon gained a superiority to all of his occupation, and the present Court House, the North and South Meeting Houses, and indeed all the improvements of Salem for nearly thirty years past have been done under his eye. In sculpture he had no rival in New England, and I possess some specimens which I should not scruple to compare with any I ever saw. To the best of my abilities, I encouraged him in this branch. In music he had a good taste and tho not presuming to be an original composer, he was among our best judges and most able performers. All the instruments we use, he could understand and was the best person to be employed in correcting any effects or repairing them. He had a fine person, a majestic appearance, calm countenance, great self command, and amiable temper. He was welcome but never

intruded. He had complained of some obstruction in the chest, but when he died it was unexpectedly. The late increase of workmen in wood has been from the demand for exportation, and this has added nothing to the character and reputation of the workmen, so that upon the death of Mr. McIntire no man is left to be consulted upon a new plan of execution beyond his bare practice."

It is generally conceded that he worked almost entirely in Salem and probably was the creator of much of the fine wood finish that distinguishes Salem houses that were built during that period. Recent discoveries have strengthened the belief that much of his work remains unproved. "Beginning with the Pierce-Nichols house of 1790, he executed a series of mansions which with their well proportioned exterior and plan, and exquisitely executed detail have made Salem the most distinguished architecturally of the smaller American cities north of Annapolis. Nor was McIntire simply a caterer to the wealthy; turnpike taverns and humble farmhouses in Essex County show unmistakable marks of his style. He designed meetinghouses for Salem and a business block, the fence around Salem common, and the figureheads of Salem ships. Throughout the short years of his active life, which stretched only from the opening of the American world commerce by the Revolution to the closing of it by President Madison, McIntire kept his hand in cabinetmaking and woodcarving as well as architecture; this New England Puritan, like the cathedral builders of the Middle Ages, was always as much craftsman as artist. In brilliance, delicacy, and refinement, his is not inferior to that of the young Duncan Phyfe or the best of the Philadelphia carvers of the Chippendale period, and thus ranks with the finest which has been produced in America." \*

<sup>\*&</sup>quot;Samuel McIntire was a man who declined to be limited by the finances of a laboring man's family or the rather rigid neo-caste society of a Puritan community; a man who persisted in educating himself not only in one fine art and a profession, but approached in a degree that old Greek ideal of turning a polished facet to the interests of his friends whatever they might be. Moreover, a study of McIntire's probate record, together with such fragments of information as have come to us from Bentley's diary and similar sources, discloses a man who assisted his neighbors in breaking free from a stifling sense of narrow aspiration and pleasure, and exerted an incalculable influence on the way Americans lived.

"The central facts surrounding Samuel McIntire are known. It was Rev. William Bentley, pastor of East Church, who persuaded Sam he should develop his abilities seriously; it was Bentley who introduced young Sam to the world of books and helped him learn to read; it was Bentley who guided him away from focusing all his effort on one subject. His probate record discloses that he owned an organ, a fine instrument, eight feet in height, it is described, with ten barrels. He also lists 'a fine toned spinet and a good violin.'

"It was only natural that as young Sam pursued the art of woodworking, the books should lead him to that ultimate application of wood artistry, namely housebuilding. He obtained a copy of Paine's English architecture and actually taught himself French so he could study two volumes on French building. His probate list also discloses that he owned a copy of Ware's book and a Paladia Architecture, the latter probably well thumbed, for he notes after its title, 'the best kind.'

"His chief vocation at this period was in carving figureheads for Salem vessels. They were generally well-liked and the moderate success he enjoyed from this art as well as the friends he made among the educated class with his scholarship and music doubtless tended \* "Samuel McIntire was a man who declined to be limited by the finances of a laboring man's

Agreeable to instructions you will receive of Messrs. Brown and Thorndike, who are owners of the cargo you have on board, and when you have discharged said cargo, if you can obtain a freight for Cadiz or Lisbon (without detaining you too long) which will purchase you a cargo of salt at either of the above places, you will proceed accordingly. If you cannot obtain a freight as above, you will lay out one hundred dollars of my money in such articles as will best suit the markets at the Cape Verde Islands and proceed to said islands and purchase me a cargo of salt on the best terms you can, and if you have any of my property on board after paying for the salt, I would have you lay it out on hides or skins if they may be obtained without detaining the vessel too long. If you should have more provisions than you may want to bring home, I would have you sell all you can part with at said islands. You will receive two hundred dollars at the place where you discharge your cargo in part for the freight of the same. I would have you take nothing but silver as there will be a loss of gold as it passes in that country. If you should purchase any hand-kerchiefs to carry to the Cape Verde Islands, I would recommend the cheapest kind and of different colors as black ones don't turn out so well at said islands. I would recommend your being as expeditious as possible as the voyage much depends on your making dispatch. Wishing you a safe and prosperous voyage, I am your friend."

On Sept. 12, 1794, these instructions were dispatched to Captain McIntire: "You being master of the schooner Nancy now lying in Beverly Harbor, my advice is that you improve the first fair wind and make the best of your way to Grand Banks and there take as many fish as your salt will save in good order for the Europea

Owing to a major leak in the vessel, they were obliged to land at Boston, Sept. 1, 1807. In Dec. 1812 he shipped on board the *Hazard* bound for Lisbon; Nov. 27, 1813, sailed for Charleston on the private armed schooner Monkey, which was hardly out of Salem harbor when she was pursued by a British ship and chased into Gloucester. He shipped at Charleston, Mar. 1, 1814, on board the privateer *Herald*, a vessel of 300 tons and carrying 125 men and nine guns. During their cruise, they captured a British packet, and Mr. Bertram was put on board as one of the prize crew. They, in turn, were captured and carried to Bermuda, where they were confined on a prison ship and finally sent to England. After the war he returned to Salem, resumed his seafaring life, and in time became master of a vessel and a prosperous merchant. Captain: I have the honor of making the following statement to you in regard to Major Fry and the party of officers who left Camp Stoneman under his command with a detachment of cavalry for the front, September 15.

We reached General Sheridan's headquarters near Strasburg, [Va.], September 21 and turned over our command. The major said to us that an escort was going on to Washington with the captured colors, and we would return to Winchester and there await its coming. Major Fry, Captain Brown, Lieutenants Stone, Gilman, McIntire, and Pressey returned to Winchester; I became separated from the party in Winchester, but saw the escort come into town and reported to the commanding officer. He requested me to look my party up as he said they were to start in half an hour. I tried to find them, but could not. I find, on getting down to Harper's Ferry, that Major Fry, Capt. N. H. Brown, Lieuts. F. P. Stone, G. E. Gilman, and George H. Pressey, hearing the escort had passed through Winchester by the Martinsburg road, galloped on (as they supposed) after them, and about five miles from Winchester were attacked by Mosby's men, fired upon, and all but Lieutenant Gilman killed or made prisoners; he escaped by returning to Winchester. It was just dark as they started from Winchester. In looking for the party in the morning, not knowing then what had become of them, although I heard a rumor in Winchester that a party of officers were captured by some of Mosby's men the night before, and also two sutler wagons destroyed, I found myself left by the escort and came on to Harper's Ferry alone, unmolested, and reported to General Stevenson. From Harper's Ferry I came with my horses to Camp Stoneman; found Lieutenant Gilman here.

For many years Eliab P. McIntire was the dominant figure in a prosperous Bostonian dry goods firm. In 1848 he founded the Boston commission firm of Mackintire, Lawrie, and Co., dealers in linens and damasks, with connections in Dundee, Scotland.

They maintained a mill at Rockport, Mass.

In 1859 he invested heavily in an Ohio coal oil company which imported coal from Scotland. During the three years preceding his death, he was president of the Charlestown Mutual Fire Insurance Company.

He was considered one of the most wealthy and influential men of Boston and Charlestown.\* It has been said that he was

\* A collection of several hundred letters written between 1845 and 1863 by Eliab P. McIntire to Rev. William Salter of Burlington, lowa, was edited by Philip Dillon Jordan and published by the New York Public Library in 1936. As Mr. Jordan has observed, "The correspondence throws into sharp relief the striking cultural differences between the East and West, between the civilized and the unrefined. The sweet voice of Jenny Lind in Boston was a contrast to the bawls of drunken roustabouts in Burlington. Mackintire was familiar with both types of society, and it is of both that he writes. Today his observations are as readable as when he first penned them in his Boston countinghouse or thought them out in his comfortable Charlestown home on Union Street."

The following excerpts were taken from Letters of Eliab Parker Mackintire: "For a year previous [to the marriage of his daughter], Mr. Mackintire had been corresponding with The following excerpts were taken from Letters of Ethab Parker Mackintire: "For a year previous [to the marriage of his daughter], Mr. Mackintire had been corresponding with Mr. Salter in an attempt to discover his condition and prospects, and to assuage the worries which arose within him, for when 'I contrast the conditions and circumstances in which my daughter has been reared with the trials and privations incident to a new country, I cannot divest myself of a good deal of solicitude.' He could never quite rid himself of his distaste for the West, and he did everything in his power to modify its culture so that it might be the East over again. Iowa was always largely a land of scrutiny, rather than of satisfaction. It never, in his mind, was anything but a boorish curiosity, chauvinistic and egocentric. Its romanticism, exemplified by the coon cap, the creaking stage, and the puffing steamboat, attracted him; its culture marked by the lack of libraries, disinterest in God, and acrimonious politics, repelled him. He hoped that some day this inland empire might refine itself. To this end he contributed his energies and his money. His generosity is seen again and again in his correspondence. He was instrumental in securing a bell for the Congregational Church at Burlington and another for Iowa College (now Grinnell) at Davenport. Contributions flowed from his purse and those of his friends to be used for the establishment and maintenance of New England Congregationalism. Hundreds of school and library books came to Iowa because of his interest. His home was the hospitable resting place for the Iowa missionaries when they arrived in Boston to reinoculate themselves with New England refinements.

"He was an apt child of Puritan New England. It is little wonder, then, that he should have inherited an aristocratic rationalism, conceiving human nature as evil, that he had a decided bent to the ethical as well as to the practical, and that he manifested

"He was an apt child of Puritan New England. It is little wonder, then, that he should have inherited an aristocratic rationalism, conceiving human nature as evil, that he had a decided bent to the ethical as well as to the practical, and that he manifested during his entire life a Calvinistic thrift. He lived in a period when the very backbone of New England society was the merchant and the churchman, and he partook, as well as he could, of the attributes of both. 'It seems,' he wrote of his son George on January 23, 1849, 'as important that our professional men and educated men in all departments of life should be pious men as that ministers should be. We can none of us think with complacency of his becoming a Unitarian, lawyer, or physician or devoting his talents and acquirements in promoting error in any form.' His interest in theology and the church was prodigious. Theologically his was a colonial mind, and not a nineteenth century one. The doctrines of the depravity of man and the lurid flare of Jonathan Edwards' hell-fires lighted the path for his feet throughout life. Although his social philosophy may have been tempered by French humanitarianism, his ecclesiastical ideology partook of determinism and authoritarianism, and his God was anthropomorphic.

"In politics Mr. Mackintire was a moderate republican, and his republicanism constantly shrunk and swelled to fit the patterns of his theology. He felt, as did so many men of Massachusetts, an intense antipathy to the Mexican War. As a business man, he was an expansionist and looked with great favor at any policy which would bring the western merchants into his countinghouse. The slavery question brought him much discomfort. He was unable to bring himself to believe it quite proper for one man to enslave another. Yet he could not come out strong for abolition. To his mind the New England abolitionist was quite as irritating as the radical southern planter. And until the very era of the rebellion he earnestly prayed God that the nation should not take up ments upon slavery and the eventful conflict form one of the most interesting sections of the correspondence."

"the most marked figure in the early history of the Winthrop Church of Charlestown and remained as a 'pillar' in it for thirty-one years," serving as deacon, superintendent of the Sabbath school, and church treasurer.

At the age of ten he was put to the study of Latin, at twelve to the learning of Greek, and at eighteen to both Hebrew and Arabic. He was graduated from the University of the City of New York in 1840, and for six months taught in the academy at So. Norwalk, Conn. After attending the Union Theological Seminary for two years and "thinking a change from the din and scenes of a great city to a quiet place would be good," he entered Andover Theological Seminary "for a year of satisfaction and delight." Two days prior to his graduation on Sept. 5, 1843, he received instructions from the American Home Missionary Society to proceed to the Territory of Iowa, "where a frontier folk, lacking preachers and teachers, were busily breaking the prairie sod in preparation for a western culture." In 1846 he was "called to minister to the Congregational flock at Burlington," and for sixty-four years he made this parish his care. During his ministry he preached two thousand and fifty written sermons and thousands more from notes or extempore. In addition to his parish work, he found time for a large amount of church and historical writing, including biographical sketches of many of the

founders of the Territory of Iowa.

The following account has been taken from Philip D. Jordan's Letters of Eliab Parker Mackintire: "He left by train for Buffalo, Oct. 7, 1843, then proceeded by boat to Chicago, whence he went by wagon to the eastern bank of the Mississippi, opposite Burlington, Iowa Territory, arriving Oct. 24, 1843. Five days later Mr. Salter preached his first sermon at Keosauqua in a room over the village blacksmith shop. On Nov. 5, 1843, he was ordained at Denmark, Iowa, and a few days later took passage on the Mississippi River steamer, New Brazil, for Davenport, which he reached Nov. 10th. In a blinding snow storm, he set out in a prairie wagon for the forlorn and forsaken settlement of Maquoketa in Jackson County. His field of labor was large, the population thin, and he traveled afoot and on horseback preaching in log courthouses, in crude barns, and at other times in the rude sod houses of the people. The first church he organized had only eighteen members. In this primitive and distasteful field he labored for two years, beset by the most disappointing and discouraging circumstances. He had catalogued himself a failure [In 1845 he wrote: "The only evidence I have that I have preached the truth among them is that they hate me."] when in 1846 he was called to minister to the Congregational flock at Burlington, a call which he received joyfully, immediately making plans to marry his 'Lady Angela' and bring her to the frontier . . . that inland empire of hard-working, hard-drinking men, fever and ague, log houses, and boundless prairies. The wicked, the wordly, and the backsliders were to comprise her western associates just as they formed the young minister's society. The Valley of Democracy was resisting New England's attempt to stamp it with the ethical parochialism of Boston. It was not yet ready for domestication and culture. Abundant land was to be had, mills were to be raised, streams harnessed, and wealth made. Individualism was far more important to the frontiersmen than organization. Yet Mary Ann sealed her compact with the equalitarian West in the Winthrop

When I think how swiftly the moments have glided away and the little improvement I have made of my time and the advantages I have had, I regret that they are past and that the moment once lost is lost forever. We may say with certainty 'that life is long which answers life's great end.' . . . I should be very much pleased to have you come here to the academy. I think you would be much pleased; the preceptor is a very fine man and endeavors to inculcate the knowledge of the only true God into the mnds of his scholars. The preceptress is a fine woman and exemplary in her conduct in school and out. There is but one thing to be praised before education and that is religion without which we cannot be happy in this world nor expect immortal felicity in the world to come. I have enjoyed my health better here than I have all summer at home; the air is very salubrious and we have the sea breeze which makes the town very healthy. The town is pleasant, thickly settled. Here are English and W. India goods stores, a Calvinist meeting house, and Free Will Baptists. They are a droll set of people; they laugh and sing and dance in their meetings and make a very great noise. . . . The studies I pursue are grammar, ancient and modern geography, polite literature, rhetoric, philosophy, composition, Latin, and twice a week receive lectures on astronomy. This is a very pleasant study. In the morning I rise early, breakfast at 7 o'clock, go to school at 8 or little after, home at 1,

Erastus McIntire, a schoolmaster, sailed from New York in Aug. 1851 aboard the steamer *Illinois*. After a three months' voyage via the Isthmus of Panama,\* he reached San Francisco, prospected in the vicinity of Sacramento, and mined about three thousand dollars worth of gold. He returned East in 1853, taught for three years, then migrated to Illinois and located at Neponset, where he served as mayor and for twenty years as president of the school board.

On one occasion, a twenty ton haystack standing only six feet from his barn was fired by an incendiary who had been enraged by Mr. McIntire's dogged attempts to rid the community of saloons. Only the heroic efforts of a volunteer bucket brigade prevented the spread of the flames to the nearby house and barn.

He removed to Iowa in 1881, and settled on land in Jasper County. He raised some of the finest blooded stock in Iowa and for many years was owner of the stallion Tangent, then pacing champion of the old western circuit.

<sup>\*</sup>On wrapping paper in ink made of lampblack and water, Ezra McIntire very ably recounted his experiences in the West. Portions of his diary are herein inserted because of their unusual interest:

unusual interest:

"Not being of rugged constitution, I started to teach school at the age of seventeen and attended the Bloomfield Academy for several years, teaching winters. In 1851, as every boy seemed to be infatuated with the spirit of adventure brought about by the report of vast and rich deposits of gold in California, I became well satisfied that men were making their fortunes there by the hundreds. Accordingly, I, in company with brothers Erastus and Albion and with many others of the Bloomfield vicinity, started for the distant Eldorado sailing from New York, August, 1851, upon the steamer Illinois. We arrived at the diggings at Columbia early in November. There we took claims and followed mining with very satisfactory results. In 1853 I returned over the same route. Sailed from San Francisco on the S. S. Sierra Nevada on Mar. 27, 1853, passed through the Golden Gate about sundown, and found ourselves upon the broad bosom of the Pacific Ocean. My journal will have to commence April 4th as some of my notes have been lost.

Apr. 4th. We came in sight of Cape San Lucas and met the steamer S. S. Louis from Panama bound for San Francisco loaded with passengers.

Apr. 5th. Crossed the entrance of Gulf of California with a smooth sea.

Apr. 7th. A case of smallpox reported to be on board causing considerable alarm among the passengers.

among the passengers.

Apr. 8th. Sea continues calm and sailing along finely. Sometime in the night, the engines stopped. The steamer was making no headway. On inquiry it was found the engineers had allowed the water to get low in the boilers, and they had to let them cool down before replenishing, thus preventing serious accident.

Apr. 9th. Much complaint has been made for days among the steerage passengers about their grub. At supper they called an indignation meeting on deck; appointed a committee of them to wait upon the captain and inform him of the condition of things and ask for better fare.

He returned East in 1853; taught at Ceresco, Mich., 1854; farmed in Maine, 1855; set out for Illinois, the following year; and located at Neponset where he settled upon a quarter section of land.

He enlisted in Co. H, 93d Ill. Regt., Aug. 14, 1862, took sick at Newbern, N. C., and was sent to the hospital at Madison, Ind., where he was discharged May 26, 1865. He fought at Vicksburg and Chattanooga, marched through Georgia with Sherman, and participated in the capture of Savannah.

Apr. 10th. Last night's meeting resulted in better fare. Today, a smooth sea. No land in sight. General good feeling prevailed.

Apr. 11th. The man sick with smallpox died today, and another case was reported.

Renewed alarm among passengers.

Apr. 12th. Arrived at San Juan anchorage at 4 p.m. without stopping at any port on the route. The passengers immediately commenced to go to the shore by small boats and

Apr. 12th. Arrived at San Juan anchorage at 4 p.m. without stopping at any port on the route. The passengers immediately commenced to go to the shore by small boats and all were glad to set foot on land again.

Apr. 13th. Early this morning the passengers were astir after camping upon the ground for the night. The crowds of natives had gathered with mustangs, donkeys, and jacks of doubtful ability, offering conveyance out to Lake Nicaragua, a distance of twelve miles. My brother and I with Mr. Coffin, securing fairly good horses, started out for the trip and arrived at Virgin Bay in the evening, found a small settlement of natives there, mostly engaged in selling to travelers rare birds, monkeys, and other curios. From this point we were to take the steamboat to cross the bay.

Apr. 14th. was spent in getting across the lake. There being no steamboat landing, considerable time was spent in taking the passengers in small boats. We finally arrived at Castillo Rapids, which is at the foot of the lake, in the afternoon. Here we remained overnight and visited an ancient fort. There were a few native soldiers on duty. The fort, which showed great age, is said to be nearly three hundred years old.

Apr. 15th. We took a small steamer called the Sir Bulwer to get down the river to Greytown, about sixty miles, the boat being loaded far too heavy had not gone more than a hundred rods when it struck a rock which disabled it. The passengers had barely time to get off before she filled with water. The steamer John M. Clayton, her mate, started out at the same time, offered to come back for us, but we dropped down the river a few miles on flatboats where another larger steamboat lay waiting, and took passage on it. But we had not gone far on this boat before it sprung a leak, and all the passengers were put ashore. We passed the night in the woods whilst repairs to the boat were being made. A Mr. Walton of Bangor, Me., was lost overboard while going to shore and drowned.

Apr. 16th. After our steamboat was repaired, we again

and we were on our way.

Apr. 18th. The sea was somewhat rough, and a good many were seasick. Land in sight on the left most of the day.

Apr. 19th. Passengers feeling better and are mostly on deck. Groups are gathered together and singing songs.

Apr. 20th. Are getting along splendidly. Sea calm. Are seeing some craft. At six o'clock p.m. sighted Cape San Antonio.

Apr. 21st. This morning the coast of Cuba is in plain sight on our right. At three o'clock p.m. a Section 21st.

Apr. 22nd. Entered the Gulf Stream and passed some of the small Bahama Islands.

Apr. 23rd. Today is our sixth from Greytown. Weather about the same. The tropical birds and monkeys are just as lively as the day we started. Sea calmer and little or no

Apr. 24th. This afternoon we left the Gulf Stream off Cape Hatters, and a dense fog set in, a very chilly wind blowing from shore which caused much discomfort to the passengers, and the tropical birds and monkeys began to look sick. Poor things! It is too much

for them. A good many were procured on the Isthmus to take home to friends.

Apr. 25th. The weather continues cold and very disagreeable as we near New York, and but a few are out on deck. Passed Egg Harbor at 12 o'clock. Our steamer was boarded by the quarantine officers and finally was permitted to proceed. Arrived at the dock at 8 o'clock p.m. having been eight days from Greytown.

Dr. McIntire's death:

"Talking about socialized medicine brought him to mind, I guess. . . . telling that almost every person we know needs medical attention and that few can afford to have it. Naturally, though, one doesn't expect the doctors to pay for it. Cases are known where they have, though, and that recalled our old family doctor, Dr. G. W. McIntire. When the World War was in full swing and everyone had flu, he cared for a good many cases. . . and it was long and trying work. So when one of his patients asked for her bill, he said, 'All right, I'll bring it to you.' And on the next call he fished the bill out of his pocket and presented it with a big paid marked across its face . . . 'The least I could do for a soldier's family,' he said. But Dr. McIntire was like that. He was typical of the old-fashioned country doctor. Remember when sickness worried our home? He'd drive out to the farm, no matter what the weather, and sit and visit while taking temperatures and thumping chests. And he'd pat each youngster on the head as he came in and fish a bit of peppermint out of his pocket for each one. He always joked about bringing our baby sister to us in a satchel. And how he drove through high water to get out to the farm and had to put his feet on the dashboard and set the 'baby satchel' on the seat to get through the high water on Spring Lake road. Well, in winter he wore a coon coat with a beaver collar, and as it lay over a chair-back our fingers itched to 'just feel' its glossy softness. But he had a half-pint size rat terrier for constant companion, and that little runt would snuggle down into the doctor's coat. And do you suppose that he'd let one of us touch it? Our doctor was gracious too. One time he was approached to donate to some cause or other about town, but he thought he wouldn't contribute this time. Know what he did? Gave a ten dollar bill to a little girl patient to donate in her name."
